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Riverside Clubhouses

Riverside Clubhouses, with locations in Hopedale, Needham, Norwood, and Wakefield, are employment and recovery centers offering hope to individuals with mental health challenges, and opportunities to achieve their full potential. A Clubhouse introduces members to a welcoming working community, one that is restorative and builds dignity and self-esteem. By participating in a Clubhouse, members gain access to opportunities to connect with community, employment, education, and friendships; they learn skills necessary to lead productive and satisfying lives; and they are able to take ownership of their own recovery.

Clubhouses are structured into work units that are responsible for specific aspects of the program. Members and staff work together to accomplish Clubhouse goals. In addition to a regular Monday through Friday work week, Clubhouses offer a variety of social activities and support on holidays, evenings, and weekends.

Clubhouse members and staff work together to support individuals with addiction concerns. Weekly twelve-step Dual Recovery Anonymous (DRA) meetings address mental health and substance use challenges together.



On-Site Activities

Riverside Clubhouse members can explore a variety of work activities at each Clubhouse, including:

- Computer-based office skills such as email management, data entry, finance and budgeting, and flyer and document development
- Hospitality-based food services, building maintenance, and horticulture
- Community outreach, newsletter publication, and social media and website management

Virtual Opportunities

Riverside Clubhouses offer many opportunities through video conferencing or telephone for members to engage with Clubhouse activities and supports, such as:

- Daily Unit Meetings with wellness and advocacy check-ins, and social activities
- Workshops on employment, education, health and wellness, Dual Recovery Anonymous, and securing housing and financial and medical benefits
- Program-wide and personalized goal planning and development meetings



Employment and Education

The Clubhouses provide a range of services to ensure member success in the workplace or in their educational pursuits, and offer employment, educational, and training resources to promote career development. Supports include:

- Career planning and job support groups
- Transitional Employment services to enter or re-enter the workforce with intensive support, along with Supported and Independent Employment programs
- Job search, resume writing, mock interviewing, and if requested, on-the-jobsite support
- Volunteer/internship placements
- Locating job training programs
- Access to General Educational Development (GED) and High School Equivalency Test (HiSET) resources
- Financial aid information
- Guidance on Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accommodations
